The Right Signal

Jesus saw a great multitude; and He was moved with compassion for them. Matthew 14:14

It was a tragic mistake. On July 3, 1988, the navy cruiser USS Vincennes shot down an Iranian airliner with 290 aboard. All were lost. The ship's captain mistakenly thought they were under attack by an F-14 Iranian fighter. Public opinion polls showed that most Americans opposed paying compensation to the victims' families. The cruel treatment of American hostages in Iran was still fresh in many minds. But President Reagan approved compensation. Asked by reporters if such payment would send the wrong signal, he replied, "**I don't ever find compassion a bad precedent.**"

To many people, the principle of revenge is so much simpler to practice. Yet compassion is Christ's way — a deep caring for the physical, emotional, and spiritual needs of the whole person. It reveals the heart of God for sinful people — for you and for me.

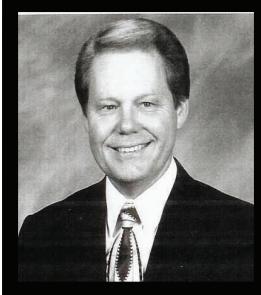

The Great Irony

Behold; .the nations are as a drop in a bucketHe gives power to the weak. -Isaiah 40:15,29 When President George Bush decided that action should be taken against Iraq to liberate Kuwait, he went to the United Nations to gain the support of "the family of nations." He realized that there is power in the unity of many countries. Yet notice how Isaiah described the nations of the world from God's perspective. They are nothing more than "a drop in a bucket" (Isa. 40:15). However great the collective power of the nations, it is insignificant compared with God's all-powerful reign over the earth. The fact that God rules over the world with such awesome might could give us a feeling of insignificance and oppression. Think about it. If the nations are no more than a drop of water in a pail, what does that make us? This is where the great irony comes in. Even though God considers the nations to be relatively insignificant, He views each individual as important. He cares about each man, woman, and child on this earth. And He renews the strength of those who trust Him. He helps them "walk and not faint" (v.31). Better than having the force of the nations behind us is the promise of having the power and love of a caring God to support us. The God who made the firmament,

Who made the deepest sea,
The God who puts the stars in place
Is the God who cares for me.

Bruised And Broken

"A bruised reed He will not break" - Isaiah 42:3.

A young boy walking along a country road pulled up some reeds in a ditch to make a whistle. He picked out a straight one, clipped the ends, made a notch and several holes in the stalk, and blew into it. But no music! He clipped and whittled some more, but still no music. Finally in frustration, he snapped the reed in two and threw it back into the ditch.



There are many bruised reeds in the body of Christ - people who have been hurt in life's fray. The Lord wants to bring music into their lives, and to do this He must fashion and shape them. He will never do what that boy did with his reed, however. He does not give up on His own and cast them aside. He keeps working with them. He knows just how much they can take — how much cutting and fashioning they require. He is patient and gentle. That's what Isaiah was portraying to Israel when he said, "*A bruised reed He will not break.*"
