RECHARGE YOUR BATTERY

Once the battery is used up you throw it away. These batteries will recharge better if you drain it of all its power. They tell me that I need to allow the battery of the cell phone get low before I plug it in. Why, because the battery will recharge better than if you recharge it all the time. After a while it will lose the capacity to recharge. Then there are the batteries we have in our automobiles. Those batteries need to stay charged all the time. If you leave the lights on and drain your battery you have to recharge it. The problem is, it will lose some of its capacity. Therefore every time the battery is drained it loses a certain percentage of its strength. Eventually it will not recharge. Therefore our automobiles have generators. Calendars

I was looking at the calendar for the upcoming year. Yours may have pictures of beautiful scenes, or cars, or animals, or no pictures at all. There are twelve separate parts of the calendar for there are 12 months in the year. As you look at each month, you will see a common pattern. There are seven columns to represent the seven days of the week. Some months will have four rows and others five. The number of days in the month and what day of the week the month starts will determine the number of rows. A calendar is both a map and a piece of history. It contains the days ahead that we may or may not see. Our life is uncertain, a vapor that appears for a little while and then vanishes away (James 4:14). Peter compares us to the flowers and grass that wither and pass away (1 Peter 2:24). Each day you can look in the obituaries in the newspaper for those who will not see another day. We do not know what will happen in the future in our lives. Each block that is created by the columns and rows is an individual day. Where we will go, what we will do, and who we will meet are not known at the present time. We may have specific dates circled or notes written to remind us of appointments and their times, but most days are left blank. Each day will provide us with unknown temptations, tasks, joys, sorrows, and triumphs. A calendar is also a piece of history. As we use each day, each block contains what we have done; whether we write it down or not does not matter. You may have a calendar with birthdays and anniversaries of family members. The Bible speaks of our deeds being written down and the judgment to come. We do not know and it may be good that we are unaware of what lies ahead. But, it will be ours to use and to give account of. Let us make sure we are headed in the right direction leave behind a good calendar.

Armchair Christianity

We've probably all heard of the stereotype in which the man sits in the chair all day barking out orders to his wife, never getting up, and demanding complete access to the remote control. Unfortunately, this is a view that many Christians hold concerning what it is like to be a child of God. Before any of us ever become a couch potato we need to ask ourselves if we are studying like a Christian should. I don't mean, are you studying like everyone else in the congregation but are you studying as the Bible says a Christian should. It is important that we understand just what the scriptures teach about our study habits.

Ephesians 5:17 says, "So then do not be foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is." Paul had said a couple of chapters earlier that when you read you can understand my insight into the mystery of Christ (3:4). So we must observe first of all that we CAN understand God's will and secondly, that this revelation is recorded in the inspired scriptures. The way we go about finding out about God's will is simply by reading. This is how we know what God would have us to do.

Being lazy with our study habits will not help us increase our knowledge. This will only come when we commit to getting our hands off the remote and onto the Holy Word.

Let us not become lazy with our example. The way people observe us comes mostly from what they see of our example. We often focus our attention on how we behave when we come to worship God but somehow forget that we are Christians all the time, not just on Sundays and Wednesdays. When you are in a dark room, the first thing that comes to your mind is turning on the light. Let's do the same with our example. This should be the same instinct that we have in the world. The world is darkness. The main thing we should want to do is be that light. A little light in a lot of darkness goes a long way. Let us never forget that. Are you experiencing the fullness of Christ. "Some drink from the fountain of life, others just gargle and spit."
