Heavenly wisdom is hard to provoke and is easily pacified -- earthly wisdom always genders strife and contention. Start each day with a prayer for wisdom. Then, seek that wisdom by studying the scriptures which are able to make you wise unto salvation (2 Timothy 3:15).


"THE GOOD FIGHT"

Some battles in life are fought and instantly won; passing tests, playing games, solving a puzzle in the newspaper, or winning at a sporting event. We preoccupy ourselves with these "battles" because they give us instantaneous gratification and bring us a measure of pleasure and self assurance.

There are other battles, however, that are ongoing and we will never, in this life, completely win until we conquer them in death. These battles are constant and daily efforts with which we must struggle on a regular basis. This is a hard thing for our society to accept who are accustomed to complex crimes being solved in a one hour TV program, sporting events ending in less than two hours. This kind of battle is only won in the continued fighting of it; it isn't a battle that is won, never to be fought again. It is a constant and daily effort.

We need to realize that living the Christian life is the same kind of battle. If we realize and accept this, I believe we will have a great weight lifted from our shoulders. The person who is constantly telling himself, "I've got to win today!" will soon find himself hopelessly burned out with trying to achieve this task. Why? Because living the Christian life is only something that is won while we continue the struggle. Paul told Timothy, "Fight the good fight of the faith?" (1 Timothy 6:12) and wage the good battle (1 Timothy 1:18). It was a battle that Paul was only expecting Timothy to win by continuing to fight it.

Let us recognize that today we fight the battle and that our victory is in our faith on a daily basis (1 John 5:4) and through this, we will overcome, not in this life, but, in the next. For today, however, if I have struggled, then I have won.

“A Mules’ Nature”

Perhaps you have heard the old story of the stubborn, balky mule? It goes like this. Two farmers were riding home in a wagon one day. The wagon was being drawn by a mule and the mule was notorious for balking. Once he balked it took hours of pulling, tugging and beating to convince him to be on his way – sometimes even building a fire under him didn’t help.

This day was one of those days. The mule balked. The first farmer said, “You’re driving, what are you going to do?” The second farmer replied, “I’m going to talk with him – perhaps I can persuade him that we need to be traveling on.” So, he climbed down, went to the nearby rail fence and picked up a six foot cedar rail (now, you faint hearted, animal rights activist who have never dealt with a mule may not want to read the rest of this). The farmer walked to the front of the mule, drew back and hit him right between the eyes and knocked the mule to his knees. The mule scrambled back to his feet stunned and quite shaken. The farmer reached over and gently whispered something in the mule’s ear. Then, he climbed back onto the driver’s seat, flicked the reins and off they went at a brisk trot. The first farmer asked, “Why did you hit him? I thought you said you were going to talk to him.” The second farmer answered pointedly, “Well, I had to get his attention first!” That is the nature of mules but human beings are not to act like mules – they are to act like reasonable, rational, thinking beings. Human beings should have convictions and be willing to stand with courage for what they believe (1 Corinthians 15:58; Jude 3). But Samuel told King Saul that stubbornness was lawlessness and idolatry (1 Samuel 15:23). The Lord cannot stand a “wimpy-washy” or “weak-kneed” person (Revelations 3:15-16), because such a man has no real convictions. But somewhere between stubbornness and “wimpy-washiness” lie the love for truth and the capacity to be taught. You can’t teach a stubborn man anything – you can teach a “wimpy-washy” man everything. Most folks don’t ride in wagons drawn by mules nowadays. Rail fences are virtually nonexistent, except for a few decorative ones. But stubbornness remains evident and not always in mules. If I have your attention, let me whisper gently in your ear and ask that you yield your will to God’s.
