The Legacy of Fools

The wise shall inherit glory, but shame shall be the legacy of fools. — (Proverbs 3:35 NKJV)

Would you want to be called a fool? I wouldn't. By definition, a **fool** is one who is *deficient in judgment, sense, or understanding*. He may also be described as one who can be easily deceived, too. It would be bad enough to be foolish in everyday matters, but consider the danger of being a fool in regard to spiritual matters: the consequences are eternal! I am **positive** most — if not all — of us would not want to be considered fools, but what if the Bible described a fool and it was me? What if **you** fit the definition? If you found out that your current thoughts and/or actions were things the Bible says describes a fool, what would you do? Would you change? Or, would you simply ignore those passages? Would you toss out the Bible entirely?

Consider, if you will, how the Bible describes the fool. If we seriously consider these things and then examine ourselves, we may know if we are fools — or not. I hope you are not, but if so, what will you do? Well, the wise thing to do would be to change, but I cannot make you do that. But consider these things, nonetheless, and think about where you stand in the estimation of God. The Bible says a fool:

Says There Is No God. (Psalm 14:1) Those who say this demonstrate their *deficiency in judgment* in that they have to either ignore or deny the evidence God has left to testify of His existence (cf. **Acts 14:17; 17:24-27; Romans 1:20-22**). It may be that they have been *easily deceived* by the overwhelming amount of indoctrination by the evolutionists who have falsified 'evidence,' ignored credible evidence that refutes his theory, or simply failed to consider the possibility of alternative explanations — just to further the theory that would eliminate God from existence. The foolishness will be manifested in the way the fool lives his or her life, free from the restrictive bonds of morals and ethics and absolutes, and indulgence in a "if-it-feels-good-do-it" type of life style.

The sad fact is, they will be proven wrong eventually, but for some it will be too late to do anything about it. The day will come when all will stand before that God they said did not exist and the Christ that gave His own life for their sins, and they will not only acknowledge his existence, but the Lordship of Jesus Christ (**Philippians 2:9-11**).


SCHOOL BEGINS THIS


