"The Sacrifices of Thanksgiving"

It's always seemed to me a sad commentary on human nature that we have to organize a holiday to encourage people to be thankful. Doesn't it seem reasonable that if we were genuinely grateful for all that God has given us, we wouldn't need to mark it on the calendar? "**Fourth Thursday in November — be sure to thank God today.**" But such creatures we are. We have to be poked and prodded and constantly reminded to do the very things we should be eager to do. We have birthdays so we don't forget to tell people at least once per year that we're glad they're alive. We have anniversaries to compel us to tell our spouses at least once each year that we love them. We have national holidays that nudge us one day out of every 365 to acknowledge our country (Independence Day), our leaders (Presidents Day), our honored dead (Memorial Day), our jobs (Labor Day) and our civil rights (King Day). If we didn't have these annual reminders, we'd let some of these things slip until one day we'd forget them completely. The Bible teaches us that true gratitude has a price: "*Let them sacrifice the sacrifices of thanksgiving, and declare His works with rejoicing*" (Psalm 107:22). At first glance, that command may seem peculiar to us. "*Sacrifices of thanksgiving? I thought we were thankful because we don't have to sacrifice.*" But the truth is that when we are thankful as we should be, we will be moved to sacrifice. In the first century of the church, the Christians in Macedonia were very poor. Yet, when they heard about the desperate material needs of suffering saints in and around Jerusalem, the Macedonian Christians enthusiastically pleaded with Paul to take their offering to Judea for the benefit of their brethren in Christ. Paul was amazed that people so poor themselves would be eager to give from their meager substance to help others. But he said of the Macedonians, "*The abundance of their joy and their deep poverty abounded in the riches of their liberality*" (2 Corinthians 8:2). Though they had little, these godly people were so thankful for even that small amount that they were anxious to give sacrificially. DAN
